

Proclamation



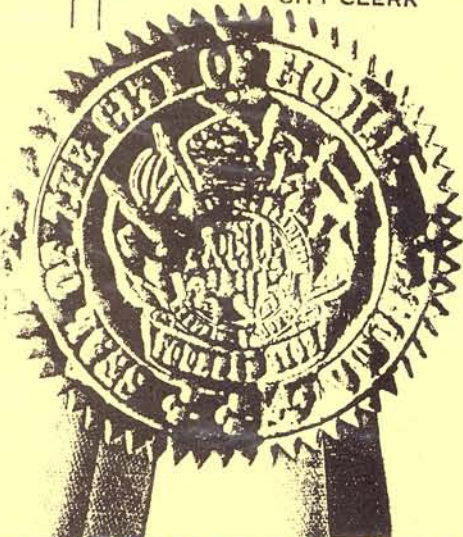
- WHEREAS, less than forty years ago, six million Jews as well as millions of others were murdered in Nazi concentration camps as part of a planned program of extermination; and
- WHEREAS, the people of the United States of America should always remember the terrible atrocities committed by the Nazis so that they are never repeated; and
- WHEREAS, the people of the United States should continually rededicate themselves to the principle of equality; and
- WHEREAS, the people of the United States should remain eternally vigilant against all tyranny, recognizing that tyranny provides a breeding ground for bigotry to flourish; and
- WHEREAS, April 13 has been designated internationally as a day of remembrance of victims of the Nazi holocaust, known as Yom Hoshoah; and
- WHEREAS, it is appropriate for the American people to join in the international commemoration.
- NOW, THEREFORE, DO I, GARY A. GREENOUGH, MAYOR OF THE CITY OF MOBILE, ALABAMA, hereby proclaim the days of April 13 through April 19, 1980, as

"DAYS OF REMEMBRANCE OF VICTIMS OF THE HOLOCAUST"

in memory of all the victims of the holocaust and in the hope that Americans will strive always to overcome cruelty and prejudice through vigilance and resistance and to remember the atrocities committed by the Nazis.
