

Rabbi Cook will be with us on Thursday, March 14th and again on Friday, March 15th. Details of times and places are listed below.

Dr. Cook is the Professor of Judaeo-Christian Studies at Hebrew Union College - Jewish Institute of Religion, Cincinnati, Ohio. He studied at Haverford College as an undergraduate. After study at Hebrew University in Jerusalem, he earned an M. A. in Hebrew Literature and Ordination at New York's branch of HUC-JIR. His doctoral work at Cincinnati focused on the Second Temple Period and concentrated on the New Testament.

He is currently writing a major book entitled Removing the Veil: Modern Jews and the New Testament. Among his other writings are his book on Mark's Treatment of the Jewish Leaders; Jesus and the Pharisees; Rabbinic Judaism and Early Christianity and many other articles and scholarly works in periodicals and journals.
